1. Significant accounting policies

The consolidated financial statements of the Town of Claresholm are the representations of management prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles for local governments established by the Public Sector Accounting Board of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants. Significant aspects of the accounting policies adopted by the Town are as follows:

(a) Reporting entity

The consolidated financial statements reflect the assets, liabilities, revenue and expenditures, changes in fund balances and change in financial position of the reporting entity. This entity is comprised of the municipal operations plus all of the organizations that are owned or controlled by the Town and are, therefore, accountable to the Town Council for the administration of their financial affairs and resources.

Taxes levied also includes requisitions for educational, health, social and other external organizations that are not part of the municipal reporting entity.

Interdepartmental and organizational transactions and balances are eliminated.

(b) Basis of accounting

Revenues are accounted for in the period in which the transactions or events occurred that gave rise to the revenues.

Funds from external parties and earnings thereon restricted by agreement or legislation are accounted for as deferred revenue until used for the purpose specified.

Government transfers are recognized in the financial statements as revenues in the period that the events giving rise to the transfer occurred, providing the transfers are authorized, the municipality has met any eligibility criteria, and reasonable estimates of the amounts can be made.

Expenditures are recognized in the period the goods and services are acquired and a liability is incurred or transfers are due.

(c) Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenue and expenditure during the period. Where measurement uncertainty exists, the financial statements have been prepared within reasonable limits of materiality. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

(d) Fund accounting

For reporting purposes, established management funds consist of the operating, capital and reserve funds. Transfers between funds are recorded as adjustments to the appropriate equity account. Proceeds from subdivision development land sales are recorded as operating fund revenues.

(e) Investments

Investments are recorded at cost.

1. Significant accounting policies, continued

(f) Inventories

Inventories of materials and supplies for consumption are valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value with cost determined by the average cost method.

Land held for resale is recorded at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Cost includes costs for land acquisition and improvements required to prepare the land for servicing such as clearing, stripping, and levelling charges. Related development costs incurred to provide infrastructure such as water and wastewater services, roads, sidewalks, and street lighting are recorded as physical assets under their respective function.

(g) Capital assets

Capital assets are reported as expenditures in the period that they are acquired.

Capital assets are recorded at cost except for donated assets, which are recorded at estimated fair value when acquired.

Government contributions for the acquisition of capital assets are recorded as capital revenue and do not reduce the related physical asset costs.

Capital assets are not amortized.

(h) Requisition over-levy and under-levy

Over-levies and under-levies arise from the difference between the actual property tax levy made to cover each requisition and the actual amount requisitioned.

If the actual levy exceeds the requisition, the over-levy is accrued as a liability and property tax revenue is reduced. Where the actual levy is less than the requisition amount, the underlevy is accrued as a receivable and as property tax revenue.

Requisition tax rates in the subsequent year are adjusted for any over-levies or under-levies of the prior year.

(i) Prepaid local improvements charges

Construction and borrowing costs associated with local improvement projects are recovered through annual special property assessments during the period of the related borrowing. These levies are collectible from property owners for work performed by the Town.

Where a taxpayer has elected to prepay the outstanding local improvement charges, such amounts are recorded as deferred revenue. Deferred revenue is amortized to revenue on a straight-line basis over the remaining term of the related borrowings.

In the event that the prepaid amounts are applied against the related borrowing, the deferred revenue is amortized to the revenue by an amount equal to the debt repayment.

(j) Capital fund

Capital fund represents the amounts available to finance (or the shortfall in financing available for) capital projects.

1. Significant accounting policies, continued

(k) Reserve fund

Reserve fund represents the amounts set aside to finance future operating and capital expenditures. Reserves are established at the discretion of Council. Transfers to and/or from the reserve fund are reflected as an adjustment to the respective fund.

(I) Equity in capital assets

Equity in capital assets represents the Town's net investment in its total capital assets, after deducting work in progress, the portion financed by third parties through debenture, bond, and mortgage debts, long-term capital borrowing, capitalized leases, and other capital liabilities which will be repaid by the municipality.

Debenture debt is repayable to Alberta Capital Finance Authority and bears interest at rates ranging from 5.875% to 11% per annum, before Provincial subsidy, and matures in periods 2007 through 2023. The average annual interest rate is 7.68% (8.30% for 2005). For qualifying debentures, the Province of Alberta rebates 60% of interest in excess of 8%, 9%, and 11% to a maximum annual rate of 12.5%, depending on the date borrowed. Debenture debt is issued on the credit and security of the Town of Claresholm at large.

Interest on long-term debt amounted to \$108,949 (2005 - \$125,167). The Town's total cash payments for interest in 2006 were \$113,199 (2005 - \$116,855).

The debt limit is calculated at 1.5 times revenue of the municipality (as defined in Alberta Regulation 255/00) and the debt service limit is calculated at 0.25 times such revenue. Incurring debt beyond these limitations requires approval by the Minister of Municipal Affairs. These thresholds are guidelines used by Alberta Municipal Affairs to identify municipalities which could be at financial risk if further debt is acquired. The calculation taken alone does not represent the financial stability of the municipality. Rather, the financial statements must be interpreted as a whole.

The total debt of \$2,619,184 includes the principal balance of the loan guarantee (\$1,289,182) for the Claresholm Golf Club, as disclosed in note 19.

18. Local authorities pension plan

Employees of the Town participate in the Local Authorities Pension Plan (LAPP), which is one of the plans covered by the Alberta Public Sector Pensions Plans Act. The plan serves about 133,000 people and 389 employers. The LAPP is financed by the employer and employee contributions and by investment earnings of the LAPP Fund.

Contributions for current service are recorded as expenditures in the year in which they become due.

The Town is required to make current service contributions to the LAPP of 7.75% of pensionable earnings up to the year's maximum pensionable earnings under the Canada Pension Plan and 10.64% on pensionable earnings above this amount. Employees of the Town are required to make current service contributions of 6.75% of pensionable salary up to the year's maximum pensionable salary and 9.64% on pensionable salary above this amount.

Total current service contributions by the Town to the LAPP in 2006 were \$49,984 (2005 - \$49,822). Total current service contributions by the employees of the Town to the LAPP in 2006 were \$43,760 (2005 - \$43,325).

At December 31, 2005, the LAPP disclosed an actuarial deficiency of \$863.6 million.

19. Contingency and commitments

The Town is a member of the Alberta Municipal Insurance Exchange (MUNIX) which provides liability insurance. Under the terms of membership, the Town could become liable for its proportionate share of any claim losses in excess of the funds held by the exchange. Any liability incurred would be accounted for as a current transaction in the year the losses are determined.

The Town has guaranteed a Macleod Savings and Credit Union Ltd. loan to the Claresholm Golf Club to a maximum of \$1,325,000. As at December 31, 2006, the principal balance of the loan was \$1,289,182.

The Town has made a commitment to the Municipal District of Willow Creek to pay for one half of the closure/post-closure costs of the Municipal District of Willow Creek's landfill. The expected future costs under this commitment are included in accounts payable and accrued liabilities.

20. Financial instruments

The Town's financial instruments consist of cash and short-term investments, receivables, temporary loan, accounts payable and accrued liabilities and long-term debt. It is management's opinion that the Town is not exposed to significant interest, currency or credit risk arising from these financial instruments. Unless otherwise noted, the fair value of these financial instruments approximates their carrying values.

The Town is subject to credit risk with respect to taxes and grants in place of taxes receivable and trade and other receivables. Credit risk arises from the possibility that taxpayers and entities to which the Town provides services may experience financial difficulty and be unable to fulfill their obligations. The large number and diversity of taxpayers and customers minimizes the credit risk.

21. Budget amounts

The 2006 budget for the Town was approved by Council on May 23, 2006 and has been reported in the consolidated financial statements for information purposes only. These budget amounts have not been audited, reviewed, or otherwise verified.

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient and proper to levy a split mill rate against the said property; and WHEREAS the total assessment liable to the residential mill rate is \$203,446,980; and WHEREAS the total assessment liable to the vacant residential mill rate is \$3,282,730; and WHEREAS the total assessment liable to the commercial/industrial mill rate is \$35,150,910; and WHEREAS the total assessment liable to the machinery and equipment mill rate is \$479,970; and WHEREAS the total assessment liable to the Senior Citizen Self-Contained Housing is \$1,713,840;

NOW THEREFORE the Municipal Council of the Town of Claresholm here assembled enacts as follows:

TOWN OF CLARESHOLM PROVINCE OF ALBERTA BYLAW# 1488

A Bylaw of the Town of Claresholm to amend Bylaw #1062 being a Bylaw setting out the General Plan for the Town of Claresholm, and Bylaw #1384 being a bylaw setting out land uses for the Town of Claresholm.

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient and proper pursuant to the provisions of <u>The Municipal Government Act</u> that the Council of the Town of Claresholm shall issue a Bylaw to amend its existing Land Use Bylaw and General Plan Bylaw.

NOW THEREFORE under the authority and subject to provisions of <u>The Municipal Government</u> Act the Municipal Council of the Town of Claresholm duly assembled does hereby enact;

I am pleased to share information with you on the Alberta government's recently announced Municipal Sustainability Initiative. This commitment is part of Premier Stelmach's promise to provide new funding of \$1.4 billion to municipalities, phased in from 2007 through 2010. In fiscal year 2007-08, municipalities will see an additional \$400 million in financial support. This funding includes incentives to encourage collaboration and cooperation between municipalities.

Under the Municipal Sustainability Initiative, your municipality is eligible to receive \$186,313 in 2007-08.

Part of this funding will be provided for local projects and activities as follows:

- \$63,802 for Core Capital projects, which include municipal roads, public transit vehicles and facilities, water and wastewater facilities, storm drainage systems, emergency service vehicles and facilities, infrastructure management systems, and solid waste management facilities.
- \$23,926 for Community Capital projects, which include libraries, cultural facilities, community halls, recreational facilities (swimming pools, arenas, curling rinks, etc.), municipal administrative and public works buildings, and community energy systems.
- \$5,362 of Conditional Operating funding to support the operation and maintenance of community facilities being operated by non-profit groups.

However, a total of \$93,223 is conditional on your municipality co-operating with its neighbours in the following areas:

- \$15,951 for Core Capital type projects (roads, water facilities, etc.) which are jointly planned with one or more neighbouring municipalities.
- \$23,926 for Community Capital type projects (libraries, arenas, etc.) which are jointly planned with one or more neighbouring municipalities.

- \$31,901 of Co-ordination Incentive funding, which must be used for co-operative capital projects that are jointly planned and jointly funded by more than one municipality. A broad range of municipal capital projects and municipal capital equipment purchases will be eligible for funding under this component if the co-operative requirements are met.
- \$21,446 for Conditional Operating funding for land use planning projects that will facilitate inter-municipal co-operation, for projects to plan and deliver services jointly, or for projects to have one administration team provide services to two or more municipalities.

These collaborative requirements will be enforced because it is important that municipalities work co-operatively together and think of larger community interests when delivering services and when planning and implementing capital projects.

The attached news release and background material provides more information on the allocation of this funding and the purposes for which it may be used.

Program and administrative details are being developed, and once these are finalized staff from Municipal Affairs and Housing will be contacting your administration to make the necessary arrangements for processing the funding.

Together with Premier Stelmach and my MLA colleagues, I am very pleased to be able to offer this support to Alberta municipalities, which is unparalleled elsewhere in Canada.

As Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing I look forward to working with you and your municipal council toward a common goal of ensuring strong, safe and sustainable municipalities that continue to prosper for the benefit of all Albertans.

As a follow-up to today's provincial budget announcement, attached is information regarding the provincial 2007 education property tax program.

The provincial education requisition is \$1.556 billion for the 2007-08 fiscal year. This is an increase of about 5.5 per cent from 2006-07. The government increased its revenue requirement to capture real growth throughout the province and to provide increased support for Alberta's basic education system.

Because the requisitions are calculated on a calendar year basis to coincide with the municipal budget process, the province will be collecting \$1.536 billion during the 2007 tax year.

The provincial uniform education property tax rates for the 2007 tax year are as follows:

Residential/farm land 4.52 mills
 Non-residential 6.64 mills
 Machinery and equipment 0.00 mills

The formula for calculating each municipality's 2007 requisition is based on the least of:

- A 12 per cent requisition increase, by class, from the 2006 requisition,
- A four-year average (2004, 2005, 2006, and 2007) of the municipality's equalized assessment, by class, or
- The municipality's 2007 equalized assessment.

Alberta Seniors and Community Supports is continuing to provide a rebate to assist senior homeowners with increases in the education portion of their property taxes. However, seniors remain responsible for paying their education property taxes in full by the due date specified on your municipality's property tax notice before accessing the rebate.

BILL C-417

An Act to establish a Memorial Wall for Canada's fallen soldiers and peacekeepers

SUMMARY

This enactment requires the Minister of National Defence to establish a Memorial Wall that will comprise the names of Canada's fallen soldiers and peacekeepers and have it located on a suitable area of public land.

PREAMBLE

WHEREAS Canada has yet to properly honour, in a suitable location that is accessible to the public at all times, all of our fallen soldiers and peacekeepers;

WHEREAS over 115,000 of our fallen soldiers and peacekeepers have their graves in seventy-five countries and hundreds of cemeteries around the world;

WHEREAS their remains cannot be repatriated to Canada;

WHEREAS we must establish a suitable national shrine to honour our fallen soldiers and peacekeepers;

AND WHEREAS proper recognition for our fallen soldiers and peacekeepers will show our love for them and our respect for their sacrifice;

NOW, THEREFORE, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows

SHORT TITLE

This Act may be cited as the Canadian Soldiers' and Peacekeepers' Memorial Wall Act.

DEFINITIONS

"Memorial Wall" means the Memorial Wall to be established.

"Minister" means the Minister of National Defence.

"public land" means an area of land owned by the Crown that is accessible to the public at all times.

ESTABLISHMENT OF MEMORIAL WALL

- (1) The Minister shall establish a Memorial Wall comprising the names of all of Canada's fallen soldiers and peacekeepers.
- (2) The Minister shall determine the design of the Memorial Wall and a suitable area of public land for the memorial wall to be located.

COLLECTION OF NAMES

The Minister shall collect the names of all Canadian soldiers and peacekeepers who die or have died during international peacekeeping missions and wars, and record their names on the Memorial Wall.

TIMELINE

The Memorial Wall shall be completed not later than two years after this Act comes into force.

MEMORIAL WALL TO BE UPDATED ANNUALLY

The list of names on the Memorial Wall shall be brought up to date no less than once a year.

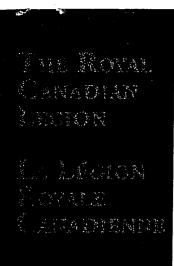

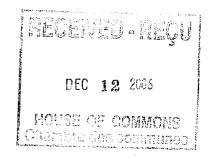

On March 2, 2007 in Lethbridge in the City Council Culver Room, I presented to the Southern Mayors and Reeves an "Emergency Resources Sharing Agreement" at the request of the group. This is a document that the South-West Mayors and Reeves have been discussing since January 1998 when regional emergency operations were reviewed in the aftermath of the Porcupine Hills Fire.

It has been passed to me to coordinate the signing and collection of the agreement and to maintain the records of all municipalities participating in the agreement.

The purpose of the agreement is to facilitate and simplify the sharing of resources between area municipalities during a time of need without requiring multiple agreements between multiple individual municipalities. It was suggested by the groups that this document should also be forwarded to AAMD&C, AUMA and your municipal insurers.

On March 2, 2007, all present agreed that I should forward this agreement to them, and their CAOs, in a format suitable for signature. Upon approval of a resolution by each Council to enter into the agreement being forwarded to me I will complete Schedule "A", by the end of June, and send a copy to each CAO so that a bylaw to enter into the agreement, with the full Schedule, can be put forward to your Council. Once the agreement is signed one copy needs to be returned to this office where the Lethbridge Fire Department will be the custodian of the agreements and Schedule.

A copy of the agreement is enclosed for consideration by your Council. I await a copy of your council resolution in the next two months so that I can complete and forward Schedule "A".

AGREEMENT ON AREA RESOURCE SHARING DURING MUNICIPAL EMERGENCY RESPONSES IN SOUTHERN ALBERTA

SCOPE

This agreement will provide the framework for Local Authorities to assist their neighboring and area local governments during emergencies including, but not limited to, fires, accidents, states of emergency and other incidents where life and/or property is endangered, and when the local authority where the incident has or is expected to occur, has requested the assistance.

1.00 DEFINITIONS & AUTHORITIES

- 1.01 A Local Authority: is defined in Section 1(g)(i, iv & v) of the Disaster Services Act.
- 1.02 A Municipality: is defined in Section 1(j) of the Disaster Services Act.
- 1.03 A Declaration of a Local State of Emergency@ is defined in Section 1(c), and implemented under Section 18. of the Disaster Services Act.
- 1.03 A Municipal Emergency: is defined as any situation where the resources of the Local Authority and its service providers are involved in efforts to mitigate immediate threats to life and/or property within the municipality.
- 1.04 The authority for municipalities to enter into this agreement by bylaw is provided in Sections 7(a & f) and 54 of the Municipal Government Act.
- 1.05 This agreement will be utilised in keeping with the intent of the following Statutes of Alberta (RSA 2000) as proclaimed and amended:

The Ambulance Services Act: (Chapter A-41)

The Disaster Services Act: (Chapter D-36)

The Municipal Government Act: (Chapter M-26)

The Safety Codes Act: (Chapter S-1)

- 1.06 If any thing in this agreement is inconsistent with the provisions of any provincial statute then the agreement is of no effect to the extent of the inconsistency.
- 1.07 This agreement will not supersede any existing contracts or agreements between local authorities to routinely provide emergency services within the area of jurisdiction of the local authorities and as defined in each contract or agreement.

2.00 GENERAL

- 2.01 This agreement will only be in force between those municipalities who are signatory to it.
- 2.02 Any signatory municipality may withdraw from this agreement by giving 90 days written confirmed notice to all other current signatories by mail, courier or facsimile.
- 2.03 A Local Authority may delegate some or all of its authority under this agreement to a designated officer(s) under the terms of Sections 203, 210, 211 and 212 of the Municipal Government Act.

3.00 APPLICATION

- 3.01 At any time that a Local Authority, or its designated officers(s), feel that the assistance of another party(s) to this agreement is required, or may be required, it will contact the party(s) either in person, by telephone, radio, facsimile or some other means to request assistance.
- 3.02 The request will indicate whether it applies to a:
 - · declared state of local emergency
 - potential or pending state of local emergency
 - municipal emergency

and will outline what assistance is requested, where it is required and whether it is required immediately, required at a specified time or if the request is to place resources in a standby mode for a possible pending requirement.

- 3.03 The designated officer(s) of the supplying party will have full authority and discretion to determine if, based on current and anticipated conditions, the supplying party is able to meet all, some or none of the request from the requesting party to assist in dealing with the requesting party's Municipal Emergency.
 - Each party, whose assistance is requested, will provide information to the requesting party as soon as possible indicating what, if any, assistance will be provided as well as when and where it will be available.
- 3.04 The requesting party will be responsible to the supplying party(s) for the payment of all normal costs associated with the provision of the service within 60 days of receipt of a written invoice for services provided.
- 3.05 The party providing assistance will be responsible for submitting a written invoice for services to the requesting party within 30 days of the service(s) being provided.
- 3.05 Rates and fees for the provision of any specific type of assistance may be agreed to in advance by two or more of the parties under separate agreement.
- 3.06 Where rates have not been previously agreed to the actual costs and historical local area rates will be used as applicable. Where rates are in dispute the current Rate Schedule published by

Alberta's Ministry of Infrastructure and Transportation will be utilised. In event of a dispute between parties, regarding invoiced amounts for services provided under this agreement, a mutually agreeable third party may be requested to facilitate a resolution.

4.00 OPERATIONAL CONSIDERATIONS

- 4.01 The party requesting assistance will be responsible for direction and supervision of the resources of the parties providing assistance subject to 4.02, 4.03 and 4.04 below.
- Where the persons providing direction and supervision of resources are of the opinion that representatives of parties supplying assistance can provide a better level of direction and supervision they may request that one or more representatives from the parties supplying assistance assume the responsibility for direction and supervision.
- 4.03 A representative of a party supplying assistance, receiving a request outlined in 4.02, may refuse a request to assume responsibility for direction and supervision.
- 4.04 A representative of a party supplying resources, and anyone under their direct supervision, may refuse to follow the directions of the persons providing direction and supervision on behalf of the requesting party when they believe that following the direction provided would result in an unreasonable risk to themselves or the persons and/or equipment under their control.
- 4.05 It is understood that when any disagreement arising in 4.04 occurs all reasonable efforts will be made to resolve the issue quickly. When this is not possible, and the issue is of a significant and ongoing nature, the representative of the party supplying resources may withdraw the resources under their control and return, along with these resources, to their own local authority. All reasonable efforts will be made to notify the requesting party and their own local authority of their decision, reasons and actions.

5.00 WAIVER & INDEMNIFICATION

- All parties understand that this agreement is NOT a guarantee that any supplying party will always be able to provide services to any requesting party. As such no supplying party shall be liable to any party for its inability, failure, delay or termination in supplying any requested service.
- 5.02 The requesting party agrees to release and save harmless the supplying party(s), including its officials, officers, volunteers and employees from any and all claims for damages or loss resulting from any inability, failure, delay or termination in supplying any requested service.
- 5.03 The requesting party agrees to release and save harmless the supplying party(s), including its officials, officers, volunteers and employees for any and all claims for damages or loss resulting from providing assistance to the requesting party, including any third party actions, provided the supplying party(s) has acted in good faith.

Mayor and council,

This town council has seen two presentations that I am aware of over the past two months. one by Bruce Thom and one by Roger Brooks. Most of us were not privy to these presentations especially the one by Bruce Thom. Many fancy titles and lists of various associations have appeared in our paper lately. They are too numerous to mention again.

According to Bruce Thom, "there are five parts of a healthy community" and these are the "five pillars of sustainability, governance, culture, environmental, economic and social". He did make perhaps the most important statement of all, "if we don't talk to the citizens, it's not really a community plan."

I am most concerned that this town council and our mayor are making decisions for <u>our</u> town with the exclusion of the citizens. There have already been too many piece-meal. let's do something ideas put forth without <u>any</u> thought to the whole.

I find it quite frightening that our own mayor would make the statement he did in the paper of March 7 referring to a comment made by someone else as to how bad the downtown looks. Our mayor replied, "I thought it is not that bad."

Here is the bottom line. The highway is going to bypass Claresholm. There is nothing inviting to either approach to the town. People see this every time they enter and leave. People stop mostly to gas up. buy refreshments and visit family, often on the way to somewhere else. When the highway moves, the memory of what Claresholm is like now will remain in their minds. People don't travel here as a destination. Why would they, really? This is the question town council needs to address to make Claresholm a destination. The downtown and main thoroughfare looks most uninviting. Putting up signs along existing sidewalks and calling it a walking path is the most ridiculous idea yet. People already utilize the sidewalks now for what they were intended for. What exactly are the wonderful sights to see? We certainly do not need signs and benches on the boulevards. That would increase the work of property owners who will be forced to trim and mow around obstacles, pick up more litter and have to deal with the ever-growing problem of picking up after dogs that defecate on property and sidewalks, which is left behind by numerous dog owners.

Lowering business taxes and increasing residential taxes is not prudent. Most buildings in the downtown commercial area were probably bought years ago and many are probably owned outright. The owners have rented out space to other businesses. Therefore

they are receiving remuneration which pays their taxes through rent. Both are in business to realize a profit. Many businesses have closed their doors. Perhaps because many property owners have not and will not put the effort into maintenance thus leaving it uninviting for the business to attract sufficient patronage - and decide it is not worth it. Residential property owners should not be made to subsidize commercial owners for their responsibility. We already pay for business with our patronage or not. Residential owners live (as a rule) in their homes for shelter. We have few services and little choice here. The answer I believe is that commercial owners must put an effort into improving their buildings. Many are derelict eye sores. When these buildings are renovated and cleaned up to an acceptable standard they could be rewarded with lower taxes. This should apply to residential also. One should not be punished for improvement. This method was adopted by Australia. It makes sense as the town will become more attractive, it will encourage more business and people might want to travel here and stop and spend time and money. Everyone would see the benefit I believe.

Let's <u>not</u> purchase the empty lot sandwiched between two buildings to beautify it, and waste precious taxpayer dollars. There are a few pedestrian alcoves now, with park benches, weeds, crumbling plaster and paint. No one uses them now. Let's complete something before the town begins new patch-work projects. An example being the library grounds and the park downtown: it's a disgrace. The idea of putting up new lighting before building renovations are done does not make sense until there is a complete plan.

What we need is a <u>master plan</u>. It cannot be hurried in a few short months but must absolutely be given respectful thought and deliberation. Claresholm's future depends on that. So let us all give this most important matter the respect it deserves.

I have a vision and ideas for this town and I would like the opportunity to discuss them.

Finally: if nothing much changes it will remain the same as it is. Or worse.

Main bid is about 25% higher than estimate and addendum is about 50% higher than estimate. It is recommended that most of the addendum (Tamarack Water Loop) not be awarded, as the Town is not getting good value for the projected costs.

The main bid prices are not that great either. However, it is doubtful that much better prices will be obtained for this construction season. However, should Council wish to have the project re-tendered, we should do so immediately.

In consultation with Claresholm Public Works, the following is recommended for award, should the Town decide to award to the lone bidder, Chinook Pipeline Inc.

The Alberta Affordable Housing Task Force gathered information from Albertans and developed a report that reflects the housing needs in the province. The task force received input from close to 1,400 Albertans. I encourage you to download the report at www.municipalaffairs.gov.ab.ca.

I am pleased to advise you that the Government of Alberta has responded to the recommendations contained in the task force report. This year, the government is allocating \$285 million in new funding to address the immediate housing pressures that were identified in the report.

The government's response includes the establishment of new funding programs for the development of affordable housing and new programs to address the immediate housing need, as well as increasing budget allocations for existing programs and services. The province established the Municipal Sustainability Housing Program that will provide \$100 million annually in block funding to municipalities for three years.

I can assure you that housing will continue to be a high priority of this government, and we will work with other orders of government, communities, and the not-for-profit and private sectors to address the housing needs of Albertans.

 - a) Director concerns about the future of the After School Care program need to be monitored. A sub-committee with Allison, Tony, and Debbie will be struck to come up with strategies for staffing and secure space to ensure continued program. Debbie will set a date once discussions with the school division and West Meadow are complete.
 - b) Community Outreach Worker
 - c) Admin support resource

Gerry moved **Motion: 0305:07** to accept staff reports for January and February 2007 as presented. Carried.

- 7. Old Business: a) Discuss audit requirement. The board is comfortable with an engagement review this year and an audit every 5 years. Current relationship with Town means that we "pay double" for bookkeeping, annual review/audit and payroll. Most FCSS programs have the benefit of the municipality providing space and doing the financial administration; this way FCSS financials are reviewed as part of the Town. Further discussion ensued regarding the understanding of roles and responsibilities around our program. Debbie will invite Tim Moorhouse to come and review FCSS responsibilities with Kris, Shirley, Gerry, and Debbie. We will also think about the positive messages we can put out for Town Councillors to show that they have made a good investment in the community through FCSS.

FCSS will cover the cost of Debbie's time and the Town should pay for km, accommodation and meals, plus the cost of the training. Motion: 0307:07 was made by Shirley to have the Director attend the Edmonton Disaster Social Services training May 11 & 12/07 and bill the Town for expenses. Carried.
 - c) Developing Capable People program from the Resiliency Institute. Leader's training for Director was discussed: Cost = \$422.65 plus time and travel. **Motion 0308:07** by Gerry for the Director to take the Developing Capable People Training Program next time it is offered. Carried.
 - d) A 3 month salary increase for Kristien and offer of employment need to be made after Mar. 31st. Chamber/health benefits need to be added. Hours have been adjusted to need and are 4 days per week @6 hours per day (24 hours per week). I would like to increase Kristein's wage from the hourly rate of \$19.00 per hour to a salary of \$26208. (\$21./hour) per annum plus benefits. Due to the complex administration of LAPP and the position being dependent upon CFSA and CHRA funding contracts it was felt that we should offer Kristein a contract with health benefits. The reception position will also be discussed at the next meeting. The personnel committee will meet and determine a plan for some type of matching pension plan for the contract position (s). **Motion 0309:07** was made by Allison to increase Kristein's pay to an annual salary of \$26208.00 for 24 hours per week plus medical benefits. Board Focus Group Report

The Board approved the key points in response to the survey distributed by ASBA

ENMAX Environmental Leadership Scholarship

The Board approved the "Awards Committee" to select the candidate for the ENMAX Environmental Leadership Scholarship and confirmed that the Superintendent or designate is also a member of that committee.

Alberta Home & School Association

The Board provided an overview of the discussions and issues from the Annual General Meeting of the Alberta Home & School Association

Literacy Support

Mr. Darryl Sequin and six students from G.R. Davis School provided an brief overview of the literacy initiatives underway at the school and early indicators of success. The students spoke of their involvement in the various initiatives and how they are being assisted to become better readers.

Ms. Atchison introduced the Later Literacy Program. Students are referred by parent request, teachers, and performance levels. The goal target is 25 to 30 students a year.

Contracts are signed by both the parents and the students in order to participate in the program. Reading is supervised at home by the parents for the 10 week session. Overall the improvement level is generally a one to two grade improvement. Evaluations are done after session.

Cheryl Chester, school librarian spoke of the accelerated reading program. This program has increased library circulation by 30 to 40%.

School Bus Discipline

Dale Slade, Coodinator of Transportation Services, provided an overview of student discipline while travelling on school buses. Mr. Slade stated 98% of cases involving student discipline are resolved with the driver. If the incident is an extreme case, a misconduct form is filled out by driver. The Principal will then talk with the student advising of any consequences. Disciplinary measures can range from a reprimand/warning to a 1 week suspension for a second offence.
