
SYNOPSIS

The applicant would like to rezone the subject lands from Residential (R1) to Duplex Residential (R2) designation.

BACKGROUND

The subject lands have an area of 1449.3 square metres (15600 square feet). The land is currently used as a residential dwelling. Surrounding zoning is Residential (R1); however there are properties that are zoned Duplex Residential (R2) and Multiple Residential (R4) in the surrounding area. The surrounding residential use is single family homes.

TOWN OF CLARESHOLM PROVINCE OF ALBERTA BYLAW # 1521

A Bylaw of the Town of Claresholm to amend Bylaw #1510 being a bylaw respecting waterworks, sewers and plumbing in the Town of Claresholm.

WHEREAS it is deerned expedient and proper pursuant to the provisions of the *Municipal Government Act* that the Council of the Town of Claresholm shall issue a Bylaw to amend its existing Water & Sewer Bylaw.

NOW THEREFORE under the authority and subject to provisions of *Municipal Government Act*, the Council of the Town of Claresholm duly assembled does hereby enact;

 The Town of Claresholm Water & Sewer Bylaw #1510 shall be amended as follows:

Add (shown in bold):

Section 11

11.9 No person will make or cause to be made any connection with any Town sewer or house drain, or appurtenance thereof for the purpose of conveying or which may convey, into the same, any flammable or explosive material, storm water from roof drainage cistern, sump pump or tank overflow, condensing or cooling water, except where the person has been given written instruction to do so from the Town based on the Town's engineering standards.

Section 12

- 12.3 Sumps must be installed as per CSA standards and Alberta Safety Codes and are not to be connected into the Town's sanitary sewer system, except where the person has been given written instruction to do so from the Town based on the Town's engineering standards.
- 2. This By aw shall take effect on the date of final passage.
- 3. Bylaw #1510 is hereby amended.

TOWN OF CLARESHOLM PROVINCE OF ALBERTA BYLAW #1522

A Bylaw of the Town of Claresholm to regulate and abate nuisances and unsightly premises and to require timely snow removal within the Town of Claresholm.

WHEREAS Section 7 of the <u>Municipal Government Act</u>, RSA 2000, Chapter M-26 permits the Council to pass bylaws respecting nuisances, including unsightly property; the safety, health and welfare of people; and the protection of people and property;

AND WHEREAS the Council deems it necessary to provide for an efficient means of regulating and encouraging the abatement of unsightly premises within the Town of Claresholm;

AND WHEREAS the Council deems it necessary to require the timely removal of ice and snow from the sidewalks located within the Town of Claresholm;

AND WHEREAS the Council deems it necessary and appropriate to repeal and replace the existing Nuisance Bylaw No. 1406;

NOW THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF CLARESHOLM, IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA, DULY ASSEMBLED, ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1 TITLE OF BYLAW

1.1 This Bylaw may be cited as the "Unsightly Premises and Snow Removal Bylaw."

SECTION 2 DEFINITIONS

- 2.1In this Bylaw, unless the context otherwise requires:
 - a) "Administration Fee" means a fee added to actual expenses incurred by the Town for measures taken pursuant to this Bylaw and such fee is equal to the greater of \$25.00 or 15% of actual expenses incurred by the Town;
 - b) "Animal Material" means any animal excrement and includes all material accumulated on a premises from pet pens or pet yards, stables, veterinary clinics, animal hospitals, kennels or feed lots;
 - c) "Ashes" means the powdery residue accumulated on a premises left after the combustion of any substance and includes any partially burnt wood, charcoal or coal;
 - d) "Building Material" means material or debris which may result from the construction, renovation or demolition of any building or other structure and includes, but is not limited to, wood, gypsum board, roofing, vinyl siding, metal, packaging material and containers of building material, gravel, concrete and asphalt and any earth, rocks and vegetation displaced during such construction, renovation or demolition of any building or other structure;
 - e) "Chief Administrative Officer" means a municipal official employed by the Town of Claresholm in the position of Chief Administrative Officer or, in his/her absence, the person appointed as Acting Chief Administrative Officer;
 - f) "Control" in reference to weeds means:
 - i) Cut, mow or carry out measures designed to inhibit propagation of the weed, or ii)Destroy the weed if specified by a Community Peace Officer, Bylaw Enforcement Officer or Weed Inspector employed by the Town of Claresholm;
 - g) "Council" means the Council of the Town of Claresholm;
 - h) "Court" means the Provincial Court of Alberta;
 - i) "Enforcement Officer" means a Community Peace Officer, Bylaw Enforcement Officer, RCMP Constable or other person appointed by the Town who is authorized to enforce Bylaws of the Town of Claresholm;

- j) "Garbage" means any household or commercial rubbish including, but not limited to, boxes, cartons, bottles, cans, containers, packaging, wrapping material, waste paper, cardboard, food, discarded clothing or fabric and discarded household items;
- k) "Graffiti" means words, figures, letters or drawings scribbled, scratched, painted or sprayed upon any surface without the consent of the owner of the building or premise on which such graffiti is placed;
- l) "Highway" is as defined in the Traffic Safety Act;
- m) "Including" or "Includes" when introducing a list of items, does not limit the meaning of the words to those items or to items of a similar kind;
- n) "Municipal Government Act" means the <u>Municipal Government Act</u>, RSA 2000, Chapter M-26, as amended or replaced from time to time;
- o) "Notice" means a notice issued pursuant to this Bylaw directing an owner of a premises to remedy a condition that is not in compliance with a provision of this Bylaw;
- p) "Owner" of a property or premise means:
 - i) a person who is registered under the Land Titles Act as the owner of the land;
 - ii) a person who is recorded as the owner of the property on the tax assessment of the Town;
 - iii) a person who has purchased or otherwise acquired the land, whether he has purchased or otherwise acquired the land directly from the owner or from another purchaser, and has not yet become the registered owner thereof;
 - iv) a person holding himself out as the person having the powers and authority of ownership of the property or premises or who for the time being exercises the powers and authority of ownership; or
 - v) a person controlling the property or premises under construction, or a person who is the occupant of the property or premises pursuant to a rental or lease agreement, license or permit;
- q) "Person" means an individual or any business entity including a firm, partnership, association, corporation, company, or society;
- r) "Premises" means any land situated in whole or in part within the Town including the external surfaces of all buildings and land immediately adjacent to any building or buildings and includes any land or buildings owned or leased by the Town;
- s) "Provincial Offences Procedures Act" means the <u>Provincial Offences Procedure Act</u>, RSA 200, Chapter P-34, and the regulations thereof, as amended or replaced from time to time;
- t) "Residential Building" means a structure used as a residence containing one or more dwelling units, including a house, multi-family dwelling, apartment building, hospital, lodging house, hotel, motel, mobile home, tent, trailer, motor home, camper, or recreational vehicle of any type;
- u) "Residential Development" means any land that is the site of one or more residential buildings, excepting farms, ranches, and other land which is used for primarily agricultural purposes;
- v) "Town" means the municipal corporation of the Town of Claresholm in the Province of Alberta, or the area located within the Town of Claresholm's corporate limits, as the context so requires;
- w) "Unsightly Premises" means any building or property or part of either that exhibits "visual evidence of a lack of general maintenance and upkeep", as defined in this Bylaw, and includes any premises upon which there is an excessive or unreasonable accumulation of:
 - i) garbage, animal or human excrement, sewage, the whole or a part of an animal carcass, dirt, soil, gravel, rocks, petroleum products, hazardous materials, containers, boxes, paper products, disassembled equipment or machinery, broken household chattels or goods;

- ii) the whole or any part of any vehicle or vehicles which are not registered with the Motor Vehicle Registry for the current year and which are inoperative by reason of disrepair, removed parts, or missing equipment, or any vehicles which are otherwise not in a roadworthy condition;
- iii) equipment, household appliances, power tools or machinery which have been rendered inoperative by reason of disassembly, age or mechanical condition;
- iv) animal material, ashes, building material, garbage, and yard material as defined in this Bylaw; or
- v) any other form of scrap, litter, trash, junk, or waste of any kind;
- x) "Vehicle" has the same meaning as defined in the <u>Traffic Safety Act</u>, and includes any motorized vehicle that is unable to be moved under its own power;
- y) "Visual Evidence of a Lack of General Maintenance and Upkeep" includes, in relation to a premises:
 - i) significant physical deterioration of buildings or other improvements, or portions of either;
 - ii) broken or missing windows, siding, shingles, shutters, eaves, or other building construction or finishing materials;
 - iii) significant fading, chipping or peeling of painted areas of buildings or other improvements;
- z) "Weeds" includes dandelions, nuisance and noxious weeds as defined by the <u>Weed</u> <u>Control Act</u>;
- aa) "Yard Material" means waste material of an organic nature formed as a result of gardening, horticultural pursuits, or agricultural activities and includes grass, tree and hedge cuttings, waste sod and decomposing plants, leaves and weeds.

SECTION 3 GENERAL PROHIBITION

- 3.1No owner or owners of a premises shall cause, allow or permit the premises to become or to continue to be an "Unsightly Premises", as defined by this Bylaw.
- 3.2 When making the determination as to whether a particular premises constitutes an "Unsightly Premises", the Court's considerations shall include any admissible evidence as to:
 - a) the general condition and state of tidiness of the neighbouring or surrounding premises;
 - b) the location and permitted use of the premises and whether or not the premises is located within a residential development;
 - c) the period of time the premises has been in the state complained of;
 - d) whether or not the premises is undergoing construction or renovation, and the period of time that such activity has been ongoing; and
 - e) any other circumstances or factors relating to the premises which the Court deems are relevant to the said determination.
- 3.3 Every owner or occupier of a premises shall ensure that graffiti placed on the premises is removed, painted over, or otherwise permanently blocked from public view within fourteen (14) days of the owner becoming aware or notified of the presence of said graffiti.

SECTION 4 WEEDS, GRASS, TREES, PESTS AND SMOKE

- 4.1 Every occupant or owner of any property or premises within the Town shall:
 - a) eradicate or control all weeds and grass on the premises, and on any boulevard which abuts or adjoins the premises, including up to the center of lanes or alleys at the rear or side of the premises;

- b) prune or remove any and all trees located on the premises that, due to a deterioration of condition or for any other reason, interfere with any public utility or public works, and are a public safety hazard;
- c) remove or prune any shrub located on the premises which is, or could be, a nuisance to any person using any publicly owned or maintained sidewalk or street;
- d) prevent stagnant water from remaining on the premises so as to avoid it becoming a potential breeding place for mosquitoes or other pests;
- e) cut or mow the grass on any boulevard or street, situated on Town owned land adjoining, or abutting or adjacent to the premises owned or occupied by them, to prevent such grass from growing to such a height as to be unsightly, having regard to the height of the grass on adjacent or surrounding premises;
- f) remove from such property any dead grass or brush or rubbish which is clearly untidy or unsightly, or which may harbor vermin or pests therein; and
- g) cut or mow the grass on such property before said grass reaches such a height as to be unsightly, having regard to the height of the grass on adjacent or surrounding property.
- 4.2 No occupant or owner of any property or premises, whether presently occupied or not, shall:
 - a) allow weeds to grow and propagate uncontrolled or excessively on the premises;
 - b) suffer or permit trees, or other vegetation growing on the property, to interfere or endanger the lines, poles, conduits, pipes, or sewers or other works of the Town;
 - c) allow any infectious blight or disease of the trees or other vegetation located on the property to go uncontrolled or unchecked; or
 - d) allow, permit or cause any opaque or dense smoke or dust to be emitted to the atmosphere from the premises.
- 4.3 Where branches, foliage or other parts of trees, shrubs or other vegetation on a premises extend beyond the property lines of the subject premises, and interfere with or obstruct any public works of the Town, including power lines, traffic signage, street lighting, and the safe movement of vehicular and pedestrian traffic within the Town, the Chief Administrative Officer, the Town Superintendent, a Designated Officer or an Enforcement Officer may authorize the immediate removal, without notice, of any such interferences and obstructions.
- 4.4 Where the Town carries out any remedial measures as required pursuant to Section 4.3 of this Bylaw, neither the Town nor any employees or contractors thereof shall be held liable in any way in relation to any such remedial actions taken.

SECTION 5 CONSTRUCTION SITES

- 5.1 An owner of a property or premises being demolished or under construction shall ensure that building materials and waste materials on the premises are removed or contained and secured in such a manner that prevents such material from being blown off or scattered from the property.
- 5.2 An owner of a property or premises being demolished or under construction shall ensure that waste building material on the premises is removed or secured within a reasonable time by means of appropriate containers.

SECTION 6 EXEMPTIONS & EXCEPTIONS

6.1 The provisions of this Bylaw shall not be interpreted to prevent bona fide and permitted commercial, industrial, agricultural, construction, demolition, renovation, landscaping, clean-up, storage or other related activities from being carried out on, or in relation to, a premises.

- 6.2 The owner of a premises that carries on, or permits the carrying on, of any activities referred to in Section 6.1 of this Bylaw shall ensure that all reasonable steps are taken to minimize the duration and visual impact of any resulting untidiness or unsightliness of the premises.
- 6.3 When determining whether the owner of a premises has "taken all reasonable steps" as required by Section 6.2, the Court's considerations shall include the considerations referred to in Section 3.2 of this Bylaw.

SECTION 7 SNOW AND ICE ON SIDEWALKS

- 7.1 An owner of a premises shall ensure:
 - a) the removal from any public sidewalk located adjacent to the premises, including private criveway crossings, all snow and ice deposited thereon, whether from natural or unnatural means, within 24 hours of such deposit, or within 24 hours of the issuance of a Snow Removal Notice in respect of the premises; and
 - b) that the snow and ice removed pursuant to section 7.1(a) is not placed upon any highway or other public property administered by the Town.
- 7.2 For the purpose of Section 7.1(a), snow and ice will be considered removed when the sidewalk is cleaned for the entire width of sidewalk to the sidewalk surface as completely as reasonably possible.
- 7.3 For the purpose of Section 7.1(a), in the case of a sidewalk being below grade resulting in repeated coverage by ice or water through drainage or melted snow or rain, the sidewalk must be cleaned as completely as reasonably possible and a non-slip, non-corrosive and salt-free material such as sand or similar material must be scattered on the surface of the sidewalk as frequently as required to maximize traction for pedestrians. The sidewalk condition must be communicated to the Chief Administrative Officer so it can be added to the list of sidewalk improvements and dealt with accordingly.
- 7.4 For the purpose of Section 7.1(a), where an owner or occupant of a premises reasonably anticipates being absent, the owner or occupant must make arrangements to ensure the sidewalks are maintained in accordance with this Bylaw.

SECTION 8 BYLAW COMPLIANCE NOTICES

- 8.1 Where an owner or occupant of a premises is found by an Enforcement Officer to be in non-compliance with any provision of this Bylaw (excepting Section 7 Snow and Ice on Sidewalks), the owner or occupant of the premises may be issued a Notice containing the following information:
 - a) the address and/or legal description of the property where remedial action is required;
 - b) the condition or conditions that are not in compliance with this Bylaw;
 - c) the remedial action that is required to bring the property into compliance;
 - d) the deadline for completion of the remedial action required, which must not be less than seven (7) days after the date of service of the Notice and must not be greater than thirty (30) days after the date of service of the Notice; and
 - e) a statement that the Town may carry out the required remedial action at the owner's expense if the required work is not completed within the allowed time.
- 8.2 An application for an extension of the deadline provided for the completion of the remedial action required in a Notice issued pursuant to Section 8.1 of this Bylaw may be applied for in writing to an Enforcement Officer not later than seven (7) days after the service of the Notice. The application must include the reasons why the deadline extension is required, and the anticipated date for completion of the required remedial action. Any such deadline extension applied for may be allowed or refused at the sole discretion of the Enforcement Officer, and the extension shall not exceed sixty (60) days after the deadline provided in the Notice.

- 8.3 Any Notice issued pursuant to Section 8.1 of this Bylaw will be deemed to have been sufficiently served upon the owner or occupant of the premises when the Notice is:
 - a) served personally upon the owner or occupant, or served in substitution upon any person who is 18 years of age or older who resides in the subject premises;
 - b) served personally upon the property manager or person apparently in charge of the premises, if the premises is not occupied or managed by the owner;
 - c) posted at a conspicuous location(s) near the main entry to the premises; or
 - d) mailed by regular mail to the owner of the premises using the address provided by the owner and/or on record with the Town of Claresholm as the mailing address for the owner of the premises, in which case the deemed date of service is five (5) days after the date of mailing.
- 8.4 The owner or occupant of a premises who has been served with a Notice issued pursuant to this Section shall fully comply with the Notice within either the original or extended time allowed for compliance.
- 8.5 Where the owner or occupant of a premises fails to comply with any provision of Section 7 (Snow and Ice on Sidewalks) of this Bylaw, an Enforcement Officer may issue and serve the owner with a Snow Removal Notice in accordance with the provisions of this Section. If the required remedial action (Snow and Ice Removal from Sidewalks) is not completed within 24 hours from the date of service of the Notice, the Town may take all reasonable measures to remove the snow and/or ice from the subject sidewalk(s) at the property-owner's expense, and the subject costs and expenses, if unpaid by the owner upon demand, shall be added to the Tax Roll of the subject property in accordance with Section 553(1)(g.1) of the <u>Municipal Government Act</u>, RSA 2000, c.M-26.

SECTION 9 ENFORCEMENT

- 9.1 Where an Enforcement Officer has reasonable grounds to believe that a person has contravened any provision of this Bylaw, the Enforcement Officer may commence enforcement of the Bylaw in relation to that person by:
 - a) issuing the person a Violation Ticket pursuant to the provisions of Part 2 of the Provincial Offences Procedure Act;
 - b) swearing out an Information and Complaint against the person; or
 - c) in lieu of prosecution, issuing the person a Bylaw Violation Tag, in a form as approved by the Chief Administrative Officer.
- 9.2 Where an Enforcement Officer issues a person a Violation Ticket in accordance with Section 9.1(a) of this Bylaw, the officer may either:
 - a) allow the person to pay the specified penalty as provided for in Section 11 of this Bylaw by indicating such specified penalty on the Violation Ticket; or
 - b) require a Court appearance of the person, pursuant to the provisions of Part 2 of the Provincial Offences Procedure Act, where the Enforcement Officer reasonably believes that such appearance is in the public interest.
- 9.3 Notwithstanding any other provision of this Bylaw, an Enforcement Officer, upon receiving and reviewing a nuisance or unsightly premises complaint, shall take reasonable steps to assess the condition of the premises that is the subject of the complaint. The Enforcement Officer shall then recommend or take whatever actions are considered appropriate to address the compliant, in all of the circumstances.
- 9.4 No provision of this Bylaw or any action taken pursuant to any provision of this Bylaw shall restrict, limit, prevent or preclude an Enforcement Officer or the Town from pursuing any other remedy in relation to a premise or nuisance as provided by the Municipal Government Act, any other law of the Province of Alberta, or any other Bylaw of the Town of Claresholm.

SECTION 10 GENERAL PENALTY PROVISION

10.1 Any person that violates any provision of this Bylaw is guilty of an offence and is liable upon conviction to a maximum fine of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), or in default of payment of the fine to imprisonment for a period not exceeding one (1) year, or to both fine and imprisonment in such amounts.

SECTION 11 MINIMUM AND SPECIFIED PENALTIES

The minimum and specified penalty for a violation of any provision of this Bylaw (excepting the provisions of Sections 4, 7, and 8.4) is a fine in the amount of:

First Offence: \$350.00 Second Offence: \$700.00 Third Offence: \$1,500.00

11.2 The minimum and specified penalty for a violation of a provision of Sections 4 and 7 of this Bylaw is a fine in the amount of:

First Offence: \$250.00 Second Offence: \$500.00 Third Offence: \$1,000.00

11.3 The minimum and specified penalty for a violation of Section 8.4 of this Bylaw is a fine in the amount of:

First Offence: \$500.00 Second Offence: \$1,000.00 Third Offence: \$1,500.00

- 11.4 Notwithstanding any other provision of this Section, if a person violates the same provision of this Bylaw four (4) times or more, the minimum and specified penalty allowable for the Fourth and each subsequent offence shall be a fine in the amount of one thousand five-hundred dollars (\$1,500.00).
- 11.5 The penalty in lieu of prosecution for a violation of any provision of this Bylaw proceeded with in accordance with Section 9.1(c) is one-half (50%) of the minimum and specified penalty provided for the particular offence by this Section.

SECTION 12 GENERAL

- 12.1 It is the intention of the Council of the Town of Claresholm that each provision of this Bylaw should be considered as being separate and severable from all other provisions. Should any section or provision of this Bylaw be found to have been improperly enacted, then such section or provision shall be regarded as being severable from the rest of this Bylaw and that the Bylaw remaining after such severance shall remain effective and enforceable.
- 12.2 It is the intention of the Council of the Town of Claresholm that all offences created pursuant to this Bylaw be construed and considered as being Strict Liability Offences.
- 12.3 Whenever the singular and masculine gender is used in this Bylaw, the same shall include the plural, feminine and neuter gender whenever the context so requires.

SECTION 13 REPEAL OF PREVIOUS BYLAW

Bylaw No. 1406, the "Nuisance Bylaw" and any amendments thereto, are hereby repealed.

SECTION 14 PASSAGE OF BYLAW



ConocoPhillips Canada (BRC) Ltd. (ConocoPhillips) plans to apply to the Energy Resources Conservation Board (ERCB) for a license to drill a directional gas well from a surface location in 11-27-12-27 W4M. The ERCB classifies this well as Category B Type 140 i.e. the well is considered "sweet" as we anticipate no hydrogen sulphide (H₂S) will be present in this well.

The well is required to produce natural gas from subsurface formation(s) for which we have acquired the mineral rights. The well is part of our current shallow gas program in the Claresholm area.

Project Description

ConocoPhillips is committed to full disclosure of its planned projects so that people in the area are informed of the activities proposed in their community. The following table summarizes our plans regarding the above noted well. If you require any additional information or would like to talk with a ConocoPhillips representative regarding this project, please do not hesitate to call any of the representatives listed at the end of this handout.

Surface Location	The well site is located approximately 0.63 km SW from the Town of Claresholm.
Project Schedule	Subject to regulatory approval, we anticipate that construction and subsequent drilling operations will begin around 1st Quarter 2009. Once drilling operations have reached the targeted depth, completion operations will begin. Completion operations open up the formation and allow trapped fluids/gases to flow to surface. The program (drilling, completion and testing operations) is expected to last around 35 to 45 days in total. As weather, rig availability and progress of drilling can all affect the timing of a project, you will be advised again if significant timing delays are anticipated.
Flaring	Clean-up Flaring
	Before any production can be tested to determine if the well is commercially productive, the well bore fluids must first be cleaned up and flaring for a short period of time is unavoidable. This flaring is a safety measure to ensure that all fluids and materials associated with drilling and completions operations are removed before gas is introduced into a pipeline.
	Clean-up flaring will be restricted to only the amount of time required to ensure that the wellbore is clean.

	information is available. ConocoPhillips will comply with the flaring requirements contained in ERCB Directive 60 Upstream Petroleum Industry Flaring, Incinerating and Venting and will advise nearby residents closer to the time that it is planned.
	At this time we anticipate total clean-up and production test flaring for this well will last for no more than 72 hours over a 3-5 day period.
	Permanent Flaring
	Once the well is placed on production, there will be no continuous flaring of produced gas from this well. Flaring will occur only infrequently as a safety measure during an unexpected event or as part of routine maintenance operations.

A Letter from the Chairman of the ERCB

Dear Neighbour,

I am writing to you because a representative of a petroleum company proposing development has recently approached you, and you may have questions. The company plans to make an application to the Energy Resources Conservation Board (ERCB) for an energy development (which may include a facility, a pipeline, or a well) on your lands or your neighbours' lands. The ERCB requires the company to either notify or personally consult with you before obtaining a licence and provide you with information that may include the documents described below. When the ERCB does not require that the documents be provided, you may request them from the company.

ERCB Public Information Documents—These include this letter, the brochure Understanding Oil and Gas Development in Alberta, EnerFAQs No. 7: Proposed Oil and Gas Development—A Landowner's Guide and the EnerFAQs series related to energy development. These documents contain information about your rights and options, as well as the roles and responsibilities of the ERCB in the regulation of Alberta's energy developments and how we can help you.

Company's Information Package—This includes sufficient information about the proposed project so that you can understand the nature, scope, and potential impacts the proposed development may have on you and your family. You will be asked to bring forward any questions or concerns you may have and to go over the specifics of the proposed development with the company representative. The company is required to answer all reasonable questions posed by you.

I encourage you to carefully review the information provided and to meet with company representatives to discuss the proposed development. The conversation should include any measures that could be put in place by the company to reduce potential impacts, alternatives to the proposal that may exist, and the overall future development proposed for your area.

If there are matters that cannot be resolved, the ERCB can provide you with more information on its Appropriate Dispute Resolution (ADR) program, which includes ERCB facilitation and third-party mediation. Unresolved issues could ultimately result in the ERCB holding a public hearing to consider the application. While the ERCB encourages all parties to first attempt to cooperatively reach agreement, all should be aware that they have the right, at any time, to request that the ERCB hold a public hearing.



First and foremost let me extend a huge Thank You for being so supportive of the recycling program here. Without you all, it would cease to exist. As you may be aware, due to the collapse in commodity values, the current value for all the products we recycle has gone to \$ 0. This is a hit for the business here but what is worse, for the first time in 17 years; Willow Creek Recycling will actually have to pay to recycle cardboard. All our products go to GPS in Lethbridge and until now they have covered all freight and trailer storage costs as part of our ongoing relationship with them. But, cardboard has dropped so badly that as of December 2008 they can no longer cover all these costs. They are willing to pay for freight but not for the storage trailer cost of \$265.00 per month. I am requesting aid to cover this cost. It doesn't seem like much but, the business here is used to receiving \$ 1500-2000 in value each month for the products we recycle which we are now getting \$ 0 for, the help would be greatly appreciated. This is strictly temporary, as soon as cardboard recovers enough to cover these costs the help will no longer be necessary.

I recently learned of the above planned development only when I encountered a petition at a local business. The petition seeks support for the development of a "meat packing plant" at the above location and it was only following an information request through your Jeff Gibeau and Kris Holbeck that I found that the plan includes establishment of an abattoir within our town limits.

I oppose the establishment of such an enterprise inside the town, at least until full public discussion is held concerning the transport and disposal of the by-products of a slaughterhouse and the impact this transport and disposal will have on the aesthetics of our community. Also, the environmental impact of such an operation should be given full public disclosure and due consideration before permission is granted to commence this activity.

I realize the Town approved the Application For A Development Permit a long time ago, on January 26th, 2000, which was 18 months before we decided to move to Claresholm. However, I cannot regard that fact as a sound reason to allow this plan to proceed without due public consideration of the impact a slaughterhouse located inside the town limits will have on our community.



- 1. Claresholm Detachment dealt with 292 occurrences in the month of December. This is an average number of occurrences for this time of year.
- 2. We had a very quiet holiday season this year with no serious issues to deal with. Because of the weather and poor road conditions over the holidays we did receive a fairly significant increase in the number of vehicle collisions, particularly on the highway. Fortunately none of these involved serious injury.
- 3. Our new cadet, Constable Marshall has purchased a home in Claresholm and has started working at the detachment. She is being Field Trained by Cst Tom Allonby and will be under his direct supervision and guidance over the next few months.
- 4. One of the highlights over the past year for our detachment is that we exceeded our goals in terms of traffic enforcement. We had a significant increase in the number of Provincial Statute charges over last year. Most of these were obtained on the # 2 Highway and statistically we are 40 % higher over the same period last year. One of our other traffic goals was to increase our enforcement of impaired drivers. In this area we have apprehended 35 % more impaired drivers.

Alberta's New Oil and Gas Royalty Regime Set to Kick In (from the CBC website December 31, 2008) Increases in Alberta's oil and gas royalty rates went into effect January 1, 2009. The new royalty framework encompasses recommendations by a governmentappointed panel that said Albertans were not getting their "fair share" of the province's resource wealth. The panel recommended in September 2007 that the province increase its annual royalty take by about 20 per cent, or \$2 billion a year. Premier Ed Stelmach decided to accept some of the panel's recommendations, choosing to hike royalties by \$1.4 billion, instead of \$2 billion. To read more, click here.

Alberta Imposes Record Penalties for Occupational Health and Safety Violations (from the Government of Alberta website, December 29, 2008) Alberta courts sent the strongest message ever to Alberta companies in 2008 that workplace health and safety must not be compromised. Penalties totalling more than \$5 million against 22 companies surpass the 2007 total of \$1.72 million against 12 companies. The percentage of penalties collected as alternate sentences has also increased. In 2007, 74 per cent of penalties were paid to safety organizations to provide training or to organizations that assist injured workers. In 2008, more than 88 per cent of the fines, nearly \$4.5 million, are in alternate sentences with the largest awards going to the University of Alberta Engineering Safety and Risk Management Program (\$345,000), Lakeland College (\$300,000) and the Red Deer College/City of Red Deer (\$300,000). Natural Gas Price Triggers Rebate for January (from the Government of Alberta website, January 2, 2009) Albertans will save approximately \$35 on their January gas bill, thanks to the Natural Gas Rebate program. Rebates are triggered when two of the three regulated natural gas companies charge regulated rates above \$5.50/GJ. Most residential consumers will have the rebate applied directly to their monthly gas bill. Large scale commercial or industrial consumers, select agricultural producers, and those who heat their homes with other fuels need to apply for rebates. The Natural Gas Rebate Program runs from October to March for most consumers. This is the time frame when Alberta residences use about 80 per cent of the total natural gas consumed for the year. Rebate amounts increase as the price of natural gas rises, with the maximum cost of natural gas to most Alberta consumers capped at \$8.75/GJ. The rebates are provided to Albertans using natural gas, propane, kerosene, heating oil, and in certain special circumstances, electricity. To read more, click here.

Government Helps Canadians Maximize their Savings with the New Tax-Free Savings Account (from the Government of Canada website, January 2, 2008) The Honourable Jim Flaherty, Minister of Finance, the Honourable Jean Pierre Blackburn, Minister of National Revenue and Minister of State (Agriculture), and Mr. Peter Aceto, President and CEO of ING DIRECT Canada, today welcomed the availability of the new Tax-Free Savings Account (TFSA) introduced by the Government of Canada in the 2008 Budget. The TFSA will give Canadians more flexibility than ever in saving for the future. Effective January 1, Canadians 18 years of age and older can set aside up to \$5000 every year in a variety of savings options and never pay tax on the income earned or on withdrawals. The income earned within a TFSA and withdrawals from the account will have no effect on eligibility for federal income-tested benefits or credits, such as the Canada Child Tax Benefit, the goods and services tax credit. Old Age Security, or the Guaranteed Income Supplement. Ban on Tobacco Sales in Pharmacies takes Effect Jan. 1 (from the Government of Alberta website, December 29. 2008) Beginning Jan. 1, 2009, the sale of all tobacco products in pharmacies, stores that contain pharmacies, health-care facilities and public post-secondary institutions will be prohibited. This is the final step in implementing Alberta's Tobacco Reduction Act . On Jan. 1, smoking was banned in all Alberta workplaces and public places. Smoking within five metres of a doorway, window or air intake of a public place or workplace is also prohibited. As of July 1, the retail display and advertising of tobacco products was banned in Alberta. Under this act, tobacco products include cigarettes, cigars, cigarillos, pipe tobacco. specialty tobacco products like chewing tobacco, snus and The snuff. Tobacco Reduction Act supports the government's commitment to improve the wellness of Albertans. The legislation is an important component of the Alberta Tobacco Reduction Strategy, which aims to reduce disease, disability and death related to tobacco use by reducing the number of young people starting to use tobacco; encouraging and helping tobacco users to quit; and reducing non-smokers' exposure to second-hand tobacco smoke. Statistics Update

Countless hours have been invested by the Technology Committee and contractors on planning the redevelopment of the Statistics section of BAIS. Our overall goal is to provide our members with a system that will provide great market intelligence and will be easy to use, eliminating the need for offline training. We will be providing access to three Statistics Canada datasets: Census of Population, Census of Agriculture, and Building Permits. Both Census databases will include comparative data from the last three Census years - 2006, 2001, and 1996. You will also be able to access Building Permit data on a monthly basis back to 2000.

Two major challenges have been encountered in our planning. First, permission has to be secured from Statistics Canada in order to make its data available to the public and our members. It is essential that this permission is secured in advance as it directly impacts the design of the user interface. With the growth in internet traffic Statistics Canada is more cautious and demanding in their licensing negotiations than they were when we first developed these products some ten years ago. Consequently negotiations have taken longer than expected but considerable progress is being made. We expect to have a licensing arrangement in place by the end of November and be in a position to purchase the Statistics Canada data.

Second, we need an affordable technology that is both easy-to-use and easy-to-maintain for developing the user and administrative interfaces to the data. We believe that we have now found an appropriate technology and are presently engaged in contract discussions with a technology consulting firm that is experienced in implementing this technology. We expect to have the new system operational near the end of Q1 in 2009. We will be communicating further details when a contract has been finalized.

Set a special time for reading


Reading before bedtime isn't always the best time—pick a time that works for you! Read while driving, waiting for supper, at the hockey arena...reading can happen anywhere at any time.
